As I See It...

Some Reflection on the Holocaust

The great Danish philosopher-theologian Soren Kierkegaard told a story of how he was walking down the street in Copenhagen one day when he saw a beautiful sign in the window of a store with the words, very ornately carved and illuminated, "we sell hats." He felt quite fortunate because he knew that he needed a new hat, and so he stepped into the store. "I would like to buy a hat." The clerk looked rather puzzled and said: "Sir, I'm sorry, we don't sell hats."

Now it was the philosopher who was puzzled, and he said: "But I saw this beautiful sign in your window, and it says quite clearly "we sell hats." "Oh, that," the clerk chuckled. "No, no, you misunderstand. We don't sell hats; we sell signs."

Many Jews come to their synagogues with a very basic misunderstanding of the essence of Judaism. They come looking for one thing and find that we are offering something quite different. What I hope to do in this article is to separate essence from periphery, the heart and life's blood of Judaism from its limb.

How very often I've heard Jews defining Judaism by the vocabulary of the Holocaust. We have all heard people whom we know vowing that they are not going to give Hitler a posthumous victory. "Rabbi, those Nazi scum wiped out over one-third of our people. I had relatives over there. I visited the town where my grandparents were born, and there is not one Jew left living there. You would not find my daughter marrying out. No way. I am going to have Jewish grandchildren, lots of them! I am not going to give Hitler a posthumous victory!"

These good Jews are active in Federation, JCC, B'nai Brith and Temple Israel. "Never again!" they cry, with indisputable justification. They will live as Jews to spite Hitler, to spite David Duke and Louis Farrakhan and Pat Buchanan and Lindon Larouche, the skinheads and the tombstone vandals and their ilk. They come to the synagogue to reaffirm their love for Judaism – a love that is defined primarily as the obverse of their hatred for anti-Semites – and they hope that their rabbi will devote at least one of his sermons to the memory of the Holocaust and to the lurking menace of contemporary anti-Semitism.

For these people – and believe me, I welcome them and I love them – what I am about to write, may be blasphemy.

Our grandchildren will not be Jews because of anti-Semitism. Thank God, they are only vaguely aware of it, and I, for one, doubt that it will ever be a major force in American life. What America is today, for better or for worse, has largely been defined by Irving Berlin and the Gershwin's, Louis Brandeis and Louis B. Mayer, Adolf Ochs and Albert Einstein, Saul Bellow and Philip Roth, David Axelrod and Alan Dershowitz, Larry David and Adam Sandler, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Bob Dylan and Mark Zuckerberg and we are not strangers! We are no longer exotic! We are an inextricable part of the fabric of America.

How I wish that half the money that Jews have given and still are giving to the American Jewish Committee

and the Wiesenthal Center and the Holocaust Museum in Washington – just half of those hundreds-of-millions of dollars had been spent for: Israel experiences, outreach programs, family education, Jewish summer camps, residential retreats, Jewish day schools.

Do you want our grandchildren to be Jewish? Then stop talking about lunatic fringe anti-Semites, and start talking about effective Jewish education! The problem is not finding the way but creating the will!!

We are living in an open society. Some of our children will marry non-Jews, and some of those non-Jews are going to be fine and desirable people. Do you want our grandchildren to be Jewish? Then stop invoking the Horror of the Holocaust and start funding Jewish camps, Hillel programs and scholarships to Israel and courses in Judaica to supplement our Sunday schools. We might also consider bringing those children to the synagogue with us more often.

Should we keep the memory of the Holocaust alive? Of course we should and we must! But the Holocaust and anti-Semitism are negatives. If all I knew of Jewish life were persecution and hatred and bigotry, I would cease to be a Jew. I would give it up today. If it is the Holocaust and anti-Semitism that has brought us to Temple Israel, then we are seeking for the heart of Judaism at the end of the limb.

May we go from strength to strength!!

Interim Rabbi Darryl Crystal

Rabbi Darryl Crystal is one of the leading interim rabbis in the Reform movement. Since 2004, he has served ten congregations ranging in size from 230 to 975 households as an interim rabbi. His pulpits have been in Georgia, Maryland, Wisconsin, Illinois, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Texas and North Carolina. Prior to his work as an interim rabbi, Rabbi Crystal served North Shore Synagogue in Syosset, NY for eighteen years from 1985 to 2003, as assistant rabbi, associate rabbi and senior rabbi. There, he created the Center for Adult Jewish Learning, which brought renowned speakers to the synagogue and led the congregation's participation in the national project to revitalize worship and congregational life, Synagogue 2000.

Lifelong learning is a passion for Rabbi Crystal. He was ordained at Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion in 1985 and has a Bachelor's degree from the University of Maryland. He studied at the PARDES Institute of Jewish Studies in Jerusalem

in 2003-2004 and he was one of the first rabbis to train with the Institute for Jewish Spirituality, which teaches rabbis, educators, and lay leaders about spirituality through study of classic texts and Jewish meditation. Rabbi Crystal trained as a hospital chaplain at Northwestern Memorial Hospital, Chicago, and was an Eisendrath Intern at the Religious Action Center, the legislative office of Reform Judaism in Washington, D.C.



NFTY and Reform Camps have been an important influence in Rabbi Crystal's life. He is a past chair of the Committee on Youth for the Central Conference of American Rabbis and was a member of the Youth Coordinating Committee that oversaw all of the youth programs for the Union for Reform Judaism.

Assistant Rabbi Deanna Sussman



Rabbi Deanna Sussman will be joining the Temple Israel community on July 1. Rabbi Sussman is a native of St. Louis, MO. For the past two years, she has served as the Rabbi Educator at Central Reform Congregation, a vibrant congregation of 780 households in the city of St. Louis. Her responsibilities

included directing the adult education program, teaching in the religious school, working with conversion candidates, mentoring B'nai Mitzvah students, leading services and performing life cycle events. Rabbi Sussman also created a monthly musical Shabbat experience for young adults in their 20's and 30's in the St. Louis area.

Rabbi Sussman attended HUC-JIR in Los Angeles. She earned a Master of Arts in Jewish Education and

was ordained in May of 2014. While at HUC-JIR, Rabbi Sussman explored many facets of the rabbinate.

In addition to student pulpits at Temple Beth Torah, Temple Beth Shalom, Beth Knesset Bamidbar, and at the China Lake Naval Air and Weapons Station, Rabbi Sussman served as the Harold M. Schulweis Rabbinic Intern at Jewish World Watch, an organization that promotes education, advocacy and action around issues of genocide and mass atrocities. She had a second rabbinic internship at Our House Grief Support Center, providing pastoral care to both children and adults. Prior to her enrollment in rabbinical school, Rabbi Sussman attended Indiana University, graduating Phi Beta Kappa with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Jewish Studies and Religious Studies and a double minor in Hebrew and Psychology.

Rabbi Sussman and her husband, Jared Berezin, are looking forward to arriving in Omaha in late June.
