Meet Our New Senior Rabbi!



Rabbi Brian Stoller has been selected to become our new senior rabbi beginning July 1. Rabbi Stoller's selection was approved at a Congregational Meeting held on Sunday, January 22. Rabbi Stoller is currently the associate rabbi at Congregation B'nai Jehoshua Beth Elohim (BJBE), Deerfield, IL. He has served at BJBE since 2008 when he was ordained as a rabbi from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, Cincinnati, OH, where he is currently also a Ph.D. Candidate in Rabbinics.

Rabbi Stoller grew up in Houston, TX, and attended The University of Texas where

he received a Bachelor of Business Administration in Honors Business Program & Finance in 1996. After graduation, he first worked as a Political Consultant and Hill Consultants in Houston and then serviced as Press Secretary for U.S. Senator Peter Fitzgerald (IL), Washington, DC. Rabbi Stoller has stated, "Seven years in politics is enough to drive you to God. That is my short explanation for why I left my career as a U.S. Senate press secretary to become a rabbi – although, in truth, there is a lot more to the story. While politics can certainly be disillusioning, I see my journey from the Capitol to the rabbinate as a personal spiritual evolution toward a fuller, more authentic version of myself,

a deeper engagement with things that really matter, and the realization of my destiny to be a teacher and spiritual guide to others."

Rabbi Stoller is married to Karen Flayhart and they have two children, Lindsay (7) and Zachary (3). For enjoyment, Rabbi Stoller likes cycling and is learning to play ukulele with his daughter along with learning to read German.



Clergy Report

New Beginnings

As we kick off this new year together, we will soon begin reading from a new book of Torah: Exodus. Exodus is the story of our people; the story of how we became slaves in Egypt and how God freed us with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm. This seminal story, a foundational event that explains who we were, continues to remind us of who we are today and who we will be tomorrow.

"Avadim Hayinu" we were once slaves in the land of Egypt. This often-quoted catchphrase reminds us that we, the Jewish people, have a heritage that we call upon to direct our future. We remember this fact in our sacred texts, our liturgy, our commentaries, and our Jewish rituals. Our choices, our rights, and our freedoms were taken from us; our dignity as human beings stripped bare.

And these collective memories are the stories that guide us, that help us make decisions today and every day. Because we were slaves in the land of Egypt, we know what oppression feels like. Because we were slaves in the land of Egypt, we know what it is like to be vulnerable and afraid. Because we were slaves in the land of Egypt, we know what it is like to be the stranger in an unknown land. Because we were slaves in the land of Egypt, we know what it is like to be persecuted. And because we know this, we are obligated to act to help those who are still held captive in the bonds of slavery. So we work to help those who fear persecution. We work to decrease poverty and increase opportunity. We work to end discrimination

and anti-Semitism. We work to make our communities a place where all people feel welcomed and accepted.

These are the issues that have plagued us in ancient times, in the recent past, and still in the present - our work is far from finished. In the same week that we begin the book of

Exodus, we celebrate and honor the work of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in promoting civil liberties and rights for all people. Dr. King reminded us time and again that slavery is more than just a physical state of being, and that it comes in all different shapes and sizes.

Our daily liturgy reflects our celebration of freedom, harkening back to that time in our history when we were not free. In our morning blessings we say "Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the Universe, who frees the captive." And we know, deep in our hearts that until all people are free, these bonds will never truly be broken. The story of the Exodus reminds us that the shackles of slavery never truly leave us. We retain a visceral connection to our past which prompts us to act on behalf of those who are still enslaved.

As we begin this new year together, and begin our reading of the book of Exodus, may we dive deep into the text together. May we learn together, study together, and act together to fight slavery, in all its many forms. May this time of study help us to think of different ways to interpret the narratives and lead us to new ways to solve the problems of the present. And may our history, our traditions, and our narratives help us to remember our past and bring peace into our future.

Treasurer Update

Temple Israel Fair Share Dues Program

Most of our annual income comes from member dues. We also get about 15% each from our endowment and religious school fees.

We use a Fair Share Dues plan based on the following principles:

- We want Temple Israel to be affordable for all of our members.
- We need everyone to contribute a fair amount to sustain the congregation.
- We understand that young members and families starting out usually cannot pay the full cost of their membership, which is \$2,720.
- We understand that there are unexpected challenges that require exceptions to paying Fair Share Dues. Our Executive Director handles those requests on a very confidential basis.
- Most of our members stay with us for many, many years. They pay higher dues as their incomes rise.
 In this way we are able to keep dues affordable for those with less income.

Graduated rate examples of the current Fair Share Dues Plan:

- Dues start at \$150, but exceptions are made, if this is out of reach
- At an income of \$10,000 the rate is 1.55%
- At an income of \$50,000 the rate is 1.85%
- At an income of \$100,000 the rate is 2.05%
- At an income of \$200,000 the rate is 2.40%
- Top dues is \$5,892 for incomes over \$220,000 or \$2.5 million net worth

In addition

- Over 20 families are Patrons who donate an extra \$2000 annually
- Over 80 families are Sponsors who pay an extra 25% over their fair share.

You will be receiving a Dues re-evaluation form this spring. Please fill it out and be sure that you will be doing your fair share for Temple Israel next year. Thank you for your support of Temple Israel!
